1. Indonesia ratified Kyoto Protocol.

After a long period of preparation to formulate the necessary documents such as the scientific rationale of the ratification, establishment of the DNA (Designated National Authority) and series of dialog with stake holders and the Legislative Body an agreement was finally reached between the government and the Peoples' Representative Assembly in June 23rd, 2004. Several developers working on biomass energy have been trained on how to formulate and prepare the necessary documents such as the PIN and PDD so that they can make use of the CDM as one alternative to promote the use of RE technology for sustainable development as well as an effective means to prevent global warming.

3. World Renewable Energy Regional Congress 2005.

On the occasion of the 50th Anniversary of the Bandung Conference, an Asian African Summit will be help in April 2005. The Indonesian Renewable Energy Society(IRES) is planning to hold a World Renewable Energy Regional Congress after being endorsed by the World Renewable Energy Network in Brighton, UK and by the Asian Center of Energy (ACE) office in Jakarta. The scheduled Congress will be hosted by the Indonesian Ministry of Energy and Mineral Resources, Ministry of Science and Technology, Ministry of Environment, and Ministry of Foreign Affairs. Several issues related to renewable energy utilization and development, from policy issues to practical aspect of RE in our effort to fight poverty in the Asian and African continent, will be discussed in plenary and technical sessions as well as in the form of workshops. The congress will also provide forum for business transaction and exhibition in our effort to bring RE technology into the main streams of development.
